



HOLE 1 • PAR 5
546 YDS.

This opening par 5 requires a well-placed drive down the right side of the fairway. The hole is lined along the left side with pine trees and bunkers, leaving the golfer with an uphill approach to a large green surrounded by palm trees.



HOLE 2 • PAR 3
155 YDS.

The second hole plays slightly uphill with water to the right and a native sand area that meanders up to the green. As the shortest hole on the golf course, this par 3 has a small undulating green that requires a good putt for birdie.



HOLE 3 • PAR 4
419 YDS.

The tee shot on the par 4 third is uphill with bunkers left and a pine grove to the right. From the right side of the fairway, a well struck mid-iron will be received by a forgiving green.



HOLE 4 • PAR 3
174 YDS.

Hole number four is a downhill medium-length par 3. With water to the right, bunkers short and left of the green, and plenty of bail areas, this hole looks harder than it plays.



HOLE 5 • PAR 4
399 YDS.

The fifth hole is a par 4 with a carry over water. The left side of the fairway and green are well protected by bunkers. Playing to an elevated green, the more water that is challenged, the easier the approach shot will become.



HOLE 6 • PAR 4
434 YDS.

The tee shot for the long par 4 sixth is very inviting. However, with a long iron shot into a green that is protected on the left by water, and on the right by pine trees, this hole is by no means a "gimme".



HOLE 7 • PAR 4
418 YDS.

Hole number seven is a very intimidating par 4 off the tee with pines guarding the left and water the length of the hole on the right. With a bunker left and short of the green, water right, and pine trees beyond, it requires two good shots to keep out of trouble on this hole.



HOLE 8 • PAR 5
521 YDS.

The eighth hole is a two shot par 5. The tee shot requires a carry over water with the lake continuing along the right side. The green is well protected on the left by bunkers and on the right by a marsh area.



HOLE 9 • PAR 4
410 YDS.

The returning ninth hole is a sharp dogleg right with a native sand area on the right side of the fairway. This par 4 is framed by a natural preserve area of pines and oaks and requires two good golf shots.



HOLE 10 • PAR 5
538 YDS.

Hole ten is a medium length par 5 with a force carry over a marsh area with bunkers left of the landing area. With water right and a bunker short of the green, a shot from the left side of the fairway provides the best chance to get home in two. The green is large but receptive, giving a chance for a sub-par score.



HOLE 11 • PAR 3
156 YDS.

The eleventh hole is a short par 3 with water short and right of the green. An accurate tee shot on this hole is imperative for a chance at birdie due to the small, stepped green.



HOLE 12 • PAR 4
360 YDS.

Surrounded by trees and marsh, the twelfth hole is moderately difficult. Hitting to an elevated green that is protected in front by bunkers makes the second shot on this par 4 the deciding factor.



HOLE 13 • PAR 5
556 YDS.

Thirteen's tee shot requires a carry over the marsh and avoidance of the bunkers on the left. This par 5 has two options for the second shot. Playing to the right has more forgiveness, but requires a demanding shot over a cluster of bunkers onto the elevated green. A second shot to the left side of the fairway avoids the carry over the bunkers, however it has a smaller landing area.



HOLE 14 • PAR 3
205 YDS.

Hole fourteen is the longest par 3 on the golf course. With bunkers to the right and back of the green, and water to the left, a well-struck long iron is required.



HOLE 15 • PAR 4
325 YDS.

Depending on the courage of the golfer, the par 4 fifteenth can be reached from the tee. With water on the left side and a bunker short of the green, this hole can make or break a good round of golf.



HOLE 16 • PAR 4
409 YDS.

The uphill par 4 sixteenth, with bunkers on the right, has a well guarded landing area. The green is protected on the left by bunkers, yet the reception of the green provides a good opportunity for a birdie.



HOLE 17 • PAR 4
395 YDS.

Hole number seventeen is a sharp dogleg left encompassed by water. With bunkers on the inside of the hole, golfers can bite off as much as they want to, leaving a wedge to the green.



HOLE 18 • PAR 4
447 YDS.

As the longest par 4 on the golf course, the eighteenth is very difficult. Water lines the right side of this hole, with bunkers left of the landing area. The green is large but guarded well by bunkers left and short, and water to the right. Two good shots are needed on this hole to walk away with a par.
